Boulevard Oaks is considered by some to be one of the most beautiful neighborhoods in North America. In 1987, the *New York Times* described South Boulevard as the "most magnificent residential street in America." The most important factor in this beauty, as the *Times* article suggests, is the neighborhood's most prized possession: its street trees. The very fabric of this urban neighborhood results from the street trees which form geometric architectural patterns, yielding a feeling which is always urban, but giving a mood of calm, civility, grace, and quietness.

"Street trees" are the trees of a coordinated species which line the streets in the area between the sidewalk and the curb, also known as the "parkway" or "tree lawn." In 1983, *Trees for Boulevard Oaks* began as a project of our civic association. Residents mapped existing street trees and identified the locations where additional street trees were needed. It was determined that a total of 2,300 street trees were required to create a perfect pattern, of which 1,200 were in place and 1,100 needed to be planted. Although we achieved and surpassed our goal 12 years ago, the program has made several hundred tree replacements and has also extended the arbor to include Bissonnet to Kirby and the Southwest Freeway from Kirby to Hazard. In all, the project has now planted over 1600 trees in the neighborhood and on the surrounding thoroughfares thanks to the care and generosity of neighbors.

Unfortunately, in recent years, some 10-20 trees are lost annually due to construction, sidewalk and sprinkler system installations that sever major tree roots, commercial encroachments, auto accidents, vandalism, drought, public improvement projects, and storms and hurricanes. But there is an even greater threat to our arbor, and that is age. The average life expectancy of a one of our typical street tree is 60-70 years. Trees that receive adequate water, are well cared for, and which do not suffer any of the insults enumerated above, should thrive well into their 70s and 80s and beyond. Most of our street trees were planted in the 1920s and 1930s and we are beginning to see more trees decline. As street trees are lost, it is essential to our neighborhood's character, not to mention Houston's air quality and health of our environment, that we continually plant replacements.

It is our objective to plant enough street trees annually to maintain a complete and healthy arbor. And despite the recent losses due to the drought and hurricanes in the last decade, we think you'll agree that Boulevard Oaks possesses one of the most outstanding arboretums of street trees on the North American continent. Protecting and maintaining it is our duty and our honor. Please help us by responding with your generous tax-deductible contribution payable *Trees for Houston*, our program's partner.

Six things you can do to help preserve our beautiful urban forest

- 1. Make your annual tax-deductible contribution to Trees for Houston (memo: "Boulevard Oaks Fund").
- 2. If the specified street trees are not in place in the parkway in front of your home, plant them by way of a tax-deductible contribution to our program in conjunction with Trees for Houston.
- 3. Keep other shrubs and ornamental plant material out of the parkway. Shrubs and plantings rob street trees of the water and nutrients they need and diminish the visual effect of the street trees.
- **4.** Don't cut down a street tree without written permission from City Forestry (311). Removing a street tree without a permit is a criminal offense. Please call the **Houston Urban Forestry Rangers at 832-395-7100** if you see a tree being illegally removed or damaged.
- 5. Consult a reputable forester before beginning construction of homes, sidewalks, driveways, or additions, and before installing irrigation systems and decorative lighting. Almost any type of construction within the drip-line of a mature tree is guaranteed to be fatal. Sidewalk variance support letters will be issued upon request.

Before removing any tree in the public right-of-way, call the City Forestry Division at 311 for a permit.

♦ Street Tree Master Plan ♦

Our program plants trees of a coordinated species on each block according to the street tree master plan. The masterplan has been fully implemented throughout Boulevard Oaks, and as trees are lost, our program replaces them according to this plan. The plan strives to respect and maintain the original street tree plan from the 1920s-1940s, while it adds diversity in areas of the neighborhood where formal tree plantings had never been implemented.
